

Request for Proposal –

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES ASSOCIATION OF ALBERTA (FCSSAA)

FCSSAA is a non-profit, membership-based organization. The FCSSAA supports Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) programs throughout the province of Alberta. FCSS is a provincial and municipal partnership with the mandate to provide preventive social services to community members. There are eight provincial FCSS regions. The FCSSAA is governed by a volunteer board that is comprised of representatives from each FCSS region.

PROJECT OVERVIEW AND OBJECTIVES

In January 2023, the <u>FCSS Accountability Framework</u> was implemented. The Framework was a collaboration between the Government of Alberta, the FCSSAA, and Alberta Municipalities, and Rural Municipalities of Alberta. Key elements of the Framework include:

- a common definition of prevention to guide both local FCSS programs at the municipal level and the wider provincial FCSS grant program;
- direction on provincial prevention priorities and strategies to help guide the work of local FCSS programs;
- a clear governance structure with roles and responsibilities for the province and participating municipalities and Metis Settlements; and
- an outcomes model and key performance measures (KPMs) to demonstrate the impact and value of FCSS in supporting prevention.

The outcome model and KPMs replace the former outcome model and associated measures bank that have been in place since 2013. The new outcome model identifies five program objectives that align with the FCSS Accountability Framework logic model and 13 corresponding KPMs that are intended to help measure the impact of the FCSS Grant Program at the provincial level.

The FCSSAA invites proposals to develop and implement a shared measurement system to enable municipalities and Metis Settlements participating in the FCSS program to measure and report on programming and outcomes. The shared measurement system must include a comprehensive set of definitions, indicators, and measurement standards to establish consistent practices for municipalities and Metis Settlements to report on the Key Performance Measures. The system is intended to support consistent financial, program, and outcome reporting and to allow the Ministry of Seniors, Community and Social Services (SCSS) and the FCSSAA to measure and report on the collective impact of the FCSS program.

ACTIVITIES

The contractors will engage in the following activities: RESEARCH

- Conduct a current state analysis including:
 - Assessing the current reporting that municipalities are providing to SCSS (full reporting system access and support will be provided by SCSS)

- Understanding municipal perspectives on the current state (what's working well, opportunities for improvement)
- \circ $\:$ Identifying reasons for inconsistencies in the current reporting to inform opportunities for improvement in the new model.
- Conducting research into effective shared measurement systems and best practices for implementing them, including cross-jurisdictional scanning. This includes:
 - Identifying best practices in aligning funding to programing and outcomes.

ANALYSIS

- Identifying existing outcome indicators in the measures bank that may be appropriate to maintain in the new model.
 - Assessing municipal capacity to implement a new model and identifying what short, medium, and long term supports may be required to support municipal staff to apply it to their FCSS programs and service.
- Defining the key terms in the KPMs (e.g., participants, referral service, community partnerships, etc.) to support consistent measurement.
- Establishing a small set of evidence-based common outcome indicators and measures to identify the percentage of participants who reported positive change on measures associated with prevention strategies after participating in local FCSS programming.
 - Where possible, consideration should be provided to alignment outcome indicators and measures with Healthy Aging Alberta's Healthy Aging Framework and the Alberta Well-Being and Resiliency Framework.
- Establishing a common indicator and measure to identify the percentage of FCSS participants who expressed satisfaction with FCSS programs/services and percentage of FCSS participants who reported that FCSS programs/services were easy to access.

DELIVERABLES

- 1. Detailed project plan including the plan to engage FCSS Directors' Network and the Metis Settlement Program Consultant to collect input for FCSSAA approval.
- 2. Current state analysis report
- 3. Recommendations report for reporting to link funding to prevention priorities and strategies, activities, and outcomes.
- 4. Recommendations report for standards for data collection and reporting.
- 5. Recommendations report for reporting requirements intended to support SCSS and the FCSSAA to gather accurate, streamlined, and timely reporting on:
 - a. Activities undertaken by the municipality.
 - b. Direct service delivery by the municipality
 - c. Indirect service delivery by civil society organizations
- 6. Recommendations report to inform the development of an annual reporting policy. Recommendations should include:
 - a. Considerations for different reporting requirements depending upon funding levels
 - b. Guidelines to support consistency in reporting.
- 7. Reporting templates (these will be used to modify the existing on-line reporting tools , IT services and systems are excluded from the scope of this project.)
- 8. Reporting guide including definitions and measurement standards.
- 9. Training materials and provision of two train-the-trainer sessions to enable SCSS and the FCSSAA to deliver training to participating municipalities and Metis Settlements.
- 10. Self-guided training materials to support the implementation and sustainment of the new model.
- 11. Final report with summarizing project and detailed description of new model.

12. Presentation of project at the FCSSAA annual conference

Recommendations will be iterative, time for review and feedback from the FCSS Directors' Network, the FCSSAA, and SCSS will be required. Regular check-in meetings are required to share progress updates with the managing committee.

Key performance measures

Key performance measures (KPMs) are measureable indicators that demonstrate progress towards intended outcomes. For the provincial FCSS Grant Program, they are important tools to help the Government of Alberta and key stakeholders understand if the program is addressing priorities and meeting program objectives. They also help to show how the work of local FCSS programs in the community fits into the provincial FCSS Grant Program as a whole.

The Government of Alberta will collect data from local FCSS programs and other sources to generate KPMs related to the priority areas and outcomes in the FCSS Outcomes Model. The KPMs are quantitative in nature (represented in numbers) and provide important information on the extent to which program activities occur, outputs are produced, and outcomes are achieved. In addition to the KPMs, additional *qualitative* data (descriptive information) may be collected from local FCSS programs and other sources to contextualize the KPMs and provide a more comprehensive understanding of the provincial FCSS Grant Program's performance. Every year, the Government of Alberta will compile data on KPMs in an annual report that will be shared with FCSS stakeholders.
